~Scott Hill, CDSE Education Division Chief With increasing threats to critical infrastructure and U.S. national security, so too does the need increase for mid- to senior-level security professionals who are prepared to address the strategic security program issues of today and emerging issues of the future.

Advanced and graduate-level courses at CDSE position U.S. Government civilian personnel and military service members for leadership roles in the security community. This edition of CDSE *Pulse* focuses on the continuing education opportunities provided by our Education Program.

What is the CDSE Education Program?

In 2012, the Education Program was launched to support professional development for mid- to senior-level U.S. Department of Defense (DoD) security managers with graduate-level and advanced-level courses. The <u>Education Program</u> is flexible, tuition-free, and offers 17 courses and five <u>certificates</u>. Each course takes 16 weeks to complete, representing one semester. Feedback from students surveyed indicates that for every class taken, a student could spend up to 10 hours per week on participation and assignments.

Requirements and recommendations for enrollment include the following:

- Registration is restricted to U.S. Government civilian employees and U.S. military service members
- Some courses require a Secret security clearance
- Some courses require the purchase of textbooks
- Security Fundamentals Professional Certification is recommended for all courses

Where do I go to Take Courses?

Each semester, Education Program students take computer-based, asynchronous courses from the comfort of their homes or workplaces. This structure allows students the flexibility to access instruction and complete assignments within an allotted timeframe, without committing to scheduled blocks of time each day. The courses are delivered by seasoned instructors using a collaborative learning management system called Sakai, which facilitates online teaching, student engagement, and research.



Through Sakai, students can review their lessons and videos,

upload assignments, and, most importantly, collaborate with other students in class, as well as their instructor.

A typical week consists of students completing the assigned reading, supplemented with a PowerPoint presentation. This is followed by a quiz, an online discussion forum, or a written assignment. Generally, the discussion forum will be based on instructor-provided discussion questions, with each student providing a response and then commenting on other student inputs.

Interview with Dustin Frazier

Dustin is a Security Specialist for the U.S. Army with a focus on the Insider Threat mission. Dustin completed all of the Education Program certificates last year.

Q1: How did you learn about CDSE and how long have you been a student?

A1: I started attending CDSE (then the DSS Academy) courses as part of the Army's security intern program in 2008. Last year, I completed the last of the 17 Education courses and earned all five certificates.

Q2: Do you have a specialty area or security focus? What stage of your career are you in?

A2: Yes, my focus is providing security support to the U.S. Army's Insider Threat program as a mid-career security professional. I've progressed from a GG-7 to GG-14 during my 11 years with the U.S. government as an Army civilian employee.

Q3: Did you register for the education program with a goal in mind?

A3: After completing the Army's two-year security intern program, I had maxed out all available security training opportunities from DIA, CDSE, and ODNI. I was looking for mid-level training and learned about the CDSE Education Program in 2012, the year it was launched. It piqued my interest and I registered for my first course shortly thereafter to see if it would assist in my progression from a security action officer to a mid-level security professional.

Q4: Can you describe the student experience in the Education Program?

A4: Yes, I was part of a collaborative learning environment that offered a lot of opportunities to network with students from other agencies and the military. We would ask questions like "I had this encounter, what did you do about it?" All of the courses were virtual with live instructors and discussion forums through Sakai. Each instructor was very knowledgeable and made the syllabus available the first day. I was able to access all lesson plans and grades, and converse with the instructor and classmates through the Sakai platform. We had mid-terms, finals, and weekly exercises, such as, reading lessons from a textbook. The lessons were PowerPoint-based, and sometimes included voice recordings. One of the hardest classes was Constitutional Law but it was also one of the most rewarding since it provided me a solid understanding of the governing statutes that many DoD security policies are derived from.

Q5: What would you tell a friend or colleague about CDSE's Education Program?

A5: I'm a big advocate of the program and I have recommended it to people that I mentor. Based on my recommendations, people are taking the education courses now. Speaking from my own experience, this is the only type of program that DoD has that prepares security pros from being action officers to transitioning to the management side of the house. It will expose you to topics that you're not going to get anywhere else - budgeting, leadership, risk management, cyber, communications, Constitutional Law, and other things you need to know. Thomas Jefferson stated long ago that "knowledge is power." That is the true testament to this program and why I would strongly recommend this curriculum to all interested DoD security professionals.
